2013 History Day at the Legislature on February 21

Please join West Virginia Archives and History, along with representatives of other state agencies, state historical and genealogical societies, museums and historic sites, history re-enactors, authors, and any and all persons interested in the history of West Virginia and her people, at History Day at the Legislature on Thursday, February 21, 2013. Display tables prepared by history-related organizations may be visited in the Capitol in the hallways and rotunda area stretching from the House of Delegates chamber to the Senate chamber. The recognition of 2013 History Heroes will take place in the morning in the Norman L. Fagan State Theater in the Culture Center. Many participants will take advantage of the day to speak with their elected representatives to discuss the preservation and promotion of the historical resources

of the Mountain State. We hope you will stop by the West Virginia Archives and History tables to view our videos of historic footage, and

to discuss with our experienced staff any questions you may have about our services.

Country Music and *Goldenseal* To Be Discussed on February 5, 2013

On February 5, 2013, John Lilly, editor/folklife director for *Goldenseal* magazine, will present "West Virginia Country Music and *Goldenseal* Magazine," at the Tuesday evening lecture in the Archives and History Library in the Culture Center in Charleston. The program will begin at 6:00 p.m. and is free and open to the public.

Lilly will discuss the history of *Goldenseal* magazine, which was established by the West Virginia Department of Commerce in 1975 and came under the Department of Culture and History in 1977. Now in

its 39th year, the quarterly magazine of traditional life is still published by the state, with a circulation of approximately 15,000. Lilly is *Goldenseal's* third editor, a position he has held since 1997. He will discuss the magazine's mission, its contributor guidelines, and production methods.

In addition, Lilly will present an overview of the magazine's coverage of traditional country music, a prominent topic in the magazine since its inception and an area of specialty for him personally. Drawing

on stories published in the magazine, the program will include details of prominent country music programs in the state such as WWVA's Original Wheeling Jamboree, WMMN's Sagebrush Roundup, and WCHS's Buddy Starcher and Sleepy Jeffers shows. Country music pioneers Blind Alfred Reed, the West Virginia Coon Hunters, and Roy Harvey will be included, as will musical celebrities Doc and Chickie Williams, Molly O'Day and Lynn Davis, the Lonesome Pine Fiddlers, and others. John Lilly is a 1996 graduate of Davis & Elkins College. He previously

was a tour guide at the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum in Nashville, Tennessee, and a former associate editor for the Old-Time Herald magazine. He is the editor of the book *Mountains of Music: West Virginia Traditional Music from Goldenseal*, and a contributor to the *Grove Encyclopedia of American Music*, *The West Virginia Encyclopedia*, the *Encyclopedia of Appalachia*, and the *Country Music Encyclopedia*.

Native American Research Will Be Focus of February 21 Program

On February 21, 2013, Greg Carroll will present “Native American Research in West Virginia” at the Thursday evening lecture in the Archives and History Library in the Culture Center in Charleston. The program will begin at 6:00 p.m. and is free and open to the public.

Carroll will discuss which tribes were located in the area between 1600 and 1800, their languages, alliances, and tribal movements. He also will provide information on

how people with possible Native American ancestry can try to find these often elusive relations.

Greg Carroll is a graduate of Marshall University. He was a staff historian at West Virginia Archives and History for 23 years until his retirement in October 2012 and focused on Native American, African American, and Civil War history.

The program is being held on the third Thursday of the month rather

than the normal second Thursday.
